You and the Judges - two Forces

On a recent "New Members' Night" at our camera club meeting, many aspects of our club's activities were discussed. We talked about PSA, The New Jersey Federation of Camera Clubs (NJFCC), and competition. I was asked to talk about what a judge looks for when he or she evaluates a picture. The ideas I shared with the group that night are listed here for the consideration of some of the newer members of PSA.

Competition night brings two forces face to face – one force is the club members who are entering their work into competition; the other force is the individual we ask to evaluate our material and score it – the judge.

Competitors rightfully expect the judge to be objective, to offer helpful comments, to be consistent in scoring and respectful of the presentations. We rightfully expect the judge to be knowledgeable of photographic technique and, ideally, to have reached some stature as a competitor. Our local judges are people who have been asked to be placed on the New Jersey Federation of Camera Clubs' listing of judges. There are no requirements the individual has to meet.

The judge expects you to enter into competition only those slides or prints that are free of dirt and lint. A photograph that is "dirty" will be so noted and scored low.

While dirt will be quickly noted, so will poor exposure. This is a mechanical function. Learn quickly if your camera meter reads high or low. A full roll of overexposed slides strongly suggests an ASA setting adjustment is necessary. Also, determine the direction of the lighting on these poor shots. The odds are you had direct overhead lighting. Overexposure is the biggest fault of "B" workers. At a recent competition night at a local club, as I sat judging the "B" class, slide after slide was overexposed. Most were taken in the middle of the day with an overheard sun.

Proper focus is also a mechanical function. Handling a camera while wearing glasses is awkward. Can you get a corrective eyepiece for your camera's viewfinder? Do you use hyperfocal distance focusing for your landscapes, or when you are using a wide angle lens? We do. Does your viewfinder show full frame?

Dirt, exposure, focus – a good judge will observe these aspects almost at once. The slide or print must past these three inspection points before its value as a picture is considered.

Now let's think about the picture as you recorded it. How did you plan and compose your image? What went through your mind as you looked through the viewfinder? The following topics should have been among your thoughts, as they are some of the basic tenets upon which your picture will be judged:

- Is this an interesting shot, with a center of interest? Be it a portrait, nature, scenic or abstract, this tenet applies.
- Where to place the center of interest. The rule of thirds, it might surprise you to learn, is not a PSA rule. Before going out judging, I bought an art book. There was a rule of thirds. A leading line might dictate the placement of a center of interest. In nature, we would not like to see the stem of a flower come in from the side of the frame, but from the bottom.
- Lighting, if directly frontal or overhead, will rarely produce a properly exposed shot. If the sun is in front of the camera plane, from the side to the front, lens flare could be a problem. On a hazy day, the odds are that you will suffer overexposure. On sunset shots, do not expose with the sun in the picture unless you can comfortably look at the sun. Move the camera to one side to avoid the sun, set you exposure, then recompose your shot. Bracket. Learn to take silhouettes of trees, parts of trees or anything that can be an interesting shot.
- Distracting elements such as bright areas, busy backgrounds, a too-large dark area. If you have a preview button on your camera, do you use it? It is surprising what shows up when the lens is stopped down.
- Vertical or horizontal? Like crossing a street, look both ways. Nature subjects usually, like portraits, look better when shot vertically.
- Learn how to crop. Rare is the picture that does not need some in-camera cropping.

All of these points are covered in some of the fine recorded lecture programs available to you as a member of PSA. Use them. It is like one-on-one teaching. You can contact headquarters for a free catalog of available programs.
