NJFCC Citation

The NJFCC Citation is the highest award that can be bestowed by the Federation. It publicly recognizes individual contributions to the advancement of the art and science of photography, and takes the form of an individually written Citation to be accompanied by an appropriate lapel button or pin to be won by the recipient.

Two recognition categories have been established to administer the granting of this Citation:

- 1. Recognition of individuals who directly or through agencies or channels of the Federation and/or its affiliated Clubs have contributed substantially to the advancement of the art and science of photography, and
- 2. Recognition of individuals who may have contributed to the advancement of photography without regard to Federation affiliations.

Proposals for the Citation [Nominations] may be initiated by any member in good standing of the Federation, either directly or through affiliated Club channels.

Citations may not be made more often than once per year, but not necessarily every year if they are not considered warranted.

The Process is detailed in the NJFCC Honors Committee Reference Guide, available on the web site. The Honors Committee is, obviously, charged with a mighty task - that is, the assessment of the Nominations from members of our many clubs. The Guide includes the "Proposer Form," a document that is prepared to support the recommendation of a candidate for Citation and which is key to the decision-making process. It cannot be stated too emphatically that the bases for nomination should be detailed and well documented, where appropriate.

This year the Nominations Committee consists of:

Diane Krajensky, Chair Ben Venezio George Hall

The NJFCC Citation is presented in November at PHOTORAMA.

It's not too early to begin your consideration of deserving candidates as the process, since the Guideline details a minimum six month process - from formal announcement that nominations are being accepted to awarding of the Citation.

As noted on the Web Site and in the December 2005 Issue of the Cable Release, the winner of the 2005 NJFCC Citation was Vinnie Kempf.

Proposed Changes to Print Rules

Print Chair Klaus-Dieter Schleim has proposed certain revision of the rules governing NJFCC print competitions. Recently, he sent these, together with his rationale, to President Rick Perkowsky. We are including the proposal in its entirety.

- Explanation of Proposed Print Rules for NJFCC -

As Print Chairman first let me state that the rules for print submissions to the NJFCC print competitions were formulated and adhered to since before I joined a Federation club in 1970. Furthermore these rules follow the guidelines used by PSA of which the Federation is a proud member!

So, if we say, foam boards and over matting ARE NOT eligible, then we follow PSA rules. PSA approved rules also specify single weight matt boards or unmated prints for submission to competitions. This was the basis from which I set out to specify the print submission rules for NJFCC competitions, which will start hopefully in September 2006. Now let me take you through each rule specifically:

1. All prints should be mounted on a single weight mat board, with a minimum dimension of 8.5 x 11 inches and a maximum dimension of 16 x 20 inches.

This rule eliminates foam core boards of any thickness as eligible material! The reason for this is to eliminate bulk, which the print chair has to deal with. (Foam core is not archival and can get creased very easy. Some workers have realized that and mounted a mat board behind the foam core! Further increasing volume and weight.) This has become an increasing problem with the number of prints being submitted since the advent of photo-imaging software and participants' printing their images from their computer.

2. No over-matting is permitted in any way.

This rule addresses again the issue of bulk and weight! I give the makers the benefit of my doubt but over matting will not prevent damage to the print. As an active competitor national as well as international in PSA sanctioned salons I know how my work comes back! As printers submitting to competitions, we can make multiple copies of prints for competition and also one, which we can treat the way we want for ourselves!

3. Printers who compete in color and/or mono prints, class A or B cannot enter Trade prints.

This rule is an ethical rule but it prevents a competitor from entering an additional class in the same competition. This is also a PSA sanctioned rule.

4. No signature, identifying marks or makers' name is allowed on the front of the print.

This rule is self-explanatory since these could bias the judges unfairly towards or against a maker (PSA sanctioned rule).

5. Any foreign matter on the back of a print, which could harm a print surface, will be disqualified.

No need to explain! We all want our prints back with as little damage as possible! Therefore, do not add to the problem!

6. Unreadable entry forms will disqualify an entry.

This is just a reminder to write clearly so others can read it!

Decreasing the bulk of each print goes a long way. It opens the possibility to increase the number of entries per class, club, and competitor. All prints get handled by the chair at least 3 times (check of entry, sorting into competition class rounds, resorting to club submissions) and have to be hauled all over the state of New Jersey for the competition. Big bulk requires a big transportation vehicle and I do not want to rent a moving van!

Creative Prints - those "non-realistic" (altered-reality) images that must have origins as photographic images that were taken only by the Maker. The final image is not to contain Graphic Art (drawings,) inserted text or Clip Art inserts. This is a photographic contest, not a graphic art contest.

Also, the Annual Spring Color Slide Competition, set for April 19th at Ridgewood Camera Club [with Closing Date: March 20] will feature both transparencies and digital slides. Camera Club at Greenbriar @ Whittingham

While all of us are getting "more mature," the operations of a camera club with an *adult community* [whose youngest member receives Social Security] presents several unique challenges.

One of these is not, antique cameras, as more than half the 25 Members of CCG@W are into digital. In fact, many of these folks fall prey to "all of them damn controls." Those that can make their own prints and, recently, the Club purchased a printer capable of 13" X 19" monsters to complement its fully functional wet darkroom.

The Club has been around for more than 20 years, but has existed in several "lives." Its current iteration has been ably led by President Stan Jacobson who, in addition to coping with G @ W's "Association," periodically serves as coach and teacher.

The Club meets twice each month all year long. Its first meeting of each month features workshops that have included Show and Tell presentations by individual members and hands-on training sessions on "Using Photoshop[®] Elements[®]." The second meeting is reserved to seminars and competition.

Augmenting the normal meeting schedule, Field Trips are taken as often as practical. These serve not only to allow photos to be shot in "new places" but also as a source of images for competition.

If there's an issue for CC G @ W, it's the restrictions on guest entry. If it can get past these, the Club will look forward to hosting a Federation Competition.
