

SHOOTING CHACHKAS By Rick Berger HUB Camera Club

They're called by many names...chachkas, chachkies, nicknacks, bric-a-brac, and by most, simply...dust collectors. We've all got 'em in our houses, but how many of you ever take pictures of them and why would you? Because some of them make great subjects for close-up, even macro, photography! Take a look around your home (including your attic.) You'll probably see items that you put on a shelf, windowsill, mantelpiece or countertop perhaps years ago, just after you returned from that longed-for summer vacation. On most days you walk by them five or six times, never even giving them a second glance. Well now it's time for them to get that glance, maybe even a stare, as you consider them as a possible subject for your next photographic masterpiece. We all spend a great deal of photo time taking shots of landscapes, scenic sunsets, family at the beach etc. Some of us have ventured into the world of close-up and macro photography by shooting images of flowers and bugs. However, one of the things that I've found to be great subjects are our chachkas. One reason is that they provide totally unique subjects. Very few folks I know have the exact same nicknacks in their houses. What this translates into is an image that you enter into a photo competition knowing full well that no one else in the room is going to enter a shot of the same object. There may be two shots of Utah's Slot Canyon, but nobody else in that room is going to have a picture of that little ceramic vase of porcelain flowers that your great grandmother bought during her trip to Italy a million years ago.

Now, other than the fact that you have what is probably the only remaining souvenir from the gift shop at the Catskill Game Farm in upstate New York, what makes this piece so "shootable" from a photographic standpoint? To begin with, older items, whether cheap souvenirs or expensive decorative pieces, usually possess a certain patina, a worn or well-used look. Their paint may have lost its original glimmer and sheen and now exhibits a soft satiny appearance. Metal items may have tarnished or even rusted. These properties lend a unique look to older items which can be very effective if photographed from particular angles and using various types of lighting. Also, if they're placed in a certain setting (other than where they happen to be sitting on your shelf) and have an appropriate background they can be made to look especially photogenic. In addition, focusing in on just a portion of the item may present an even more compelling photo; one revealing textures, patterns and colors you may not have noticed when viewing the object in its entirety.

Another interesting way to photograph these items is by placing them in a group with other similar objects, perhaps a group of other miniature vases, or a group of full sized vases to show the scale of that little vase. Even more fun is to locate them in juxtaposition to completely unrelated items. Try putting that little vase in among a pile of bananas, or rocks! There's no limitation as to what you can do. Let your mind wander. Attempt to think of the craziest combinations of things you can imagine, set up your camera and shoot away! If you want to combine your item with something unattainable, those of you who are adept at editing in Photoshop can surely concoct something in that program. That's probably the only way you're going to be able to place your little garden gnome nicknack on the nose of that Boeing 747. Just remember, in today's critical society, if you can't keep that photo looking like the real deal somebody's going to pass a comment about how you "Photoshopped" the image.

As with all of our digital images, once your photo gem is on your computer, you can perform all the creative tweaking you want to transform the image of your chachka into a masterpiece of fine art.

One thing that I find particularly attractive about photographing bric-a-brac and related items in your home is that you don't have to leave your house to do it. No rainy day or snowstorm ever prevented me from taking pictures of my "stuff." Furthermore, shooting like this is completely inexpensive. In fact, it's free! No need for travel, expensive macro lens, backgrounds etc. Just pose the item in front of a white towel or on a tabletop located near a window. Use a piece of tin foil as a reflector and Voila...instant studio!

Right now I'm going on an expedition. I'm going to explore my house for stuff to shoot, all thanks to my love of photography and chachkas!



Lighting and the Dramatic Portrait

The difference between an ordinary photograph and a truly striking portrait lies in the photographer's ability to pierce the obvious and reveal the intimate nature of the subject. The play of available angles, light and shadow, soft shapes and hard lines are tools to create not just a photo, but a work of art. In this seminar, you will add these tools to your camera bag. Using his own work as reference, Michael will explain his techniques for creating light and shadow and will demonstrate how he creates his stylistic and dramatic images. He will explain his specialty lighting, and show you the setups he used to create the striking signature looks for this new work. The last 20 minutes of this seminar will be a Q&A with some of his specialty gear shown.

Michael Grecco is a director and one of the top photographers in the world who has created iconic portraits of the most recognized entertainment stars, recently Steven Spielberg, Martin Scorsese, Will Ferrell, Penelope Cruz and Teri Hatcher. His movie "Naked Ambition" has been a hit movie winning critical acclaim. His award-winning still images are seen in trendsetting magazines such as Esquire, Time, Entertainment Weekly and Maxim. He has also photographed authors and scientists, skateboarders and musicians, and the locals he meets in his travels around the country. He is author of the best-selling photographer's guide Lighting and the Dramatic Portrait: The Art of Celebrity and Editorial Photography.
